

Religious Freedom

As I write this, I am preparing for the final meeting for the first round of the Fishing Tips book groups. Chapter 8 is titled "Say Who You Are". It about the importance of a congregation figuring out who they are and what they stand for. And perhaps more importantly, how and why a congregation should declare and display that message for the wider community to see.

For decades, the United Church of Christ has fought to defend and uphold the rights of the most vulnerable members of society. This is what Jesus calls us to do, as the representatives of God's will on Earth, and this is a legacy that we can be proud of. Unfortunately, these rights are under attack, by the very people who claim to be acting on behalf of the church. We need to hold fast to our legacy, remind ourselves of who we are, and raise our voices in solidarity with the people who might be hurt by these changes to our laws. Jesus' message was always about comforting, healing, and reconciliation. He didn't advocate to control other people, and we need to let the community know that there are people in the church who advocate for fairness, justice, and the dignity of all people.

I am deeply disturbed by the current trajectory of our country, and I hope that Plymouth Congregational Church can be a voice of reason and love in the days to come. Our founding fathers created a nation in which the church was separated from the state for a reason. This allows not only people, but for the church, to be free in their religious expression, or lack thereof. No one should be forced to believe in a certain way or be forced to worship in a certain way. As Barbara Brown Taylor said:

"Jesus was not killed by atheism and anarchy. He was brought down by law and order allied with religion, which is always a deadly mix. Beware those who claim to know the mind of God and who are prepared to use force, if necessary, to make others conform. Beware those who cannot tell God's will from their own."

There isn't much we can do about the weather. And apparently there isn't anything we can do about the cute bunnies who find Plymouth's Community Garden a veritable feast. Between the two of them (weather and rabbits) our garden plot #13 suffered a bit. Rabbits are particularly partial to bean greens, and the cabbage leaves are practically porous. But we are hopeful that in the coming months we will have produce to give to our neighbors, the Afghan refugees. The invitation to weed, water or harvest still holds. Flood Damage to YWCA

You may have read that the flash flood in Helena on July 3 caused significant damage to local businesses. Among the non-profits experiencing significant loss is the Helena YWCA, a recipient of Plymouth's good will and resources over the years. The water collected in the lower level of the building, flooding the basement level classroom and storage areas, irrevocably destroyed stored mattresses, bedding, furniture as well as clothing for babies, children and women. Jenifer Gursky, Director of the Y, asks the public to support their efforts to raise funds so that measures can be taken to address the flood damage. (Their insurance may not cover the costs associated with flood.) From the amount budgeted for use by Plymouth's Outreach and Social Justice Committee, we have delivered a check to help as best we can. You, of course, are invited to help as you can; refer to the "Y" website. Or contact HACF/United Way, who are coordinating financial support for all those agencies affected. At this time do not send or contribute hard goods to replace those lost in the flood. The 27 residents living at the "Y" are inconvenienced by recent events, but their living areas were not affected.

Moderator's Message

The Church Council has been busy approving bids for work on the church, endorsing the vital work of outreach and social justice, tweaking bylaws, and discussing communications and worship. For the past decade, we've all heard concerns about the aging boiler that heats water for the system that keeps the church and daycare warm in the winter. As I write, Montana City Plumbing and Heating is dismantling the old boiler, and rusty, sooty parts are filling a scrap trailer. We're eager to see to new, shiny boilers that should deliver heat at about 98% efficiency. The total cost will be \$106,172. A large portion of this cost will be covered by a bequest to Plymouth from Betty Purvis. Others have made regular contributions to a boiler fund. We are grateful to these benefactors who have made new boilers, pumps and other equipment possible.

The Council and its various committees have enjoyed working with Pastor Charles (including the food he prepares and shares) over these past eight months. As we approach the one-year mark under Pastor Charles' guidance, the congregation will have the opportunity to vote on the future of our pastoral leadership. The Search Committee recommended that the Rev. Wei be presented to the Congregation for a Settled Pastor position, to be voted on at a Congregational meeting following church on September 18, 2022. If the vote is affirmative, an installation ceremony will be scheduled in early October.

Also, the Council will present updated bylaws to the congregation on September 18 for possible approval. The congregation will be encouraged to make suggestions for revisions as soon as the revised bylaws are posted on the website in August.

At the July 6 meeting, the Council voted to proceed with website redesign. Please visit the Plymouth Congregational Church website periodically and provide feedback about its ease of use, attractiveness, content value and timeliness.

I hope you are enjoying our Montana summer and felt grateful for our recent precipitation, despite the fury of our recent storms.

Treasurer's Report

Welcome to summer! At the half-way mark in our fiscal year, I have a few concerns to report regarding our financial situation, although we continue to have close to three months operating expenses in our general funds. Our endowment Fund with the United Church Funds has taken a severe hit in the stock market recently, so we will not take any interest from the account. We had planned to take \$3000 in interest income this year, but that looks unlikely because it has fallen below the \$100,000 benchmark for taking the interest income for the operating budget. Coupled with lower stewardship donations we may feel a crunch in the next two quarters of the year.

Stewardship pledges for 2022 were budgeted at \$113,740, the amount the congregation pledged to give. That comes to \$28,435 per quarter. In the second quarter, April through June, we received \$20,200, or \$8,235 below the pledged amount. On behalf of the council, I ask you to not forget Plymouth as you prepare to go on summer vacation or review your spending for the summer. The office will be sending out stewardship statements shortly, and if you can make sure you are current that would be a big relief.

On a positive note, our ad hoc building use — rentals to groups for one-time events — has increased, and while this is a small portion of our budget it is helpful and also increases usage and awareness of who we are. Please let your friends and neighbors know they can consider Plymouth as a place to host meetings or events.

The last category of expenses that has increased is in the area of technology – streaming services, social media and communications, and our website. We have received some generous donations to help us cover one-time purchases, for which we are extremely grateful, but we realize going forward that maintaining these essential services will add lines – and expenses – to our future budgets.

So please enjoy summer in all its glory, remembering you can attend church virtually in real-time or any time afterwards through the wonders of technology. You can find the streaming service right on our website.
