Step Aside, Jesus!

Have you ever said something in the spur of the moment, not really thinking too much about it, that just stopped you in your tracks? This is how we communicate all the time: in conversation, when giving instructions, when we're yelling at the TV or the other drivers on the road. We don't stop to ponder each and every word that comes out of our mouths. Most of what we say isn't worth writing down, but sometimes, something shocking, or profound, or both, will come out of our mouths.

Susan Butler and I were in my office on Sunday, discussing the new slogan for the congregation. As Susan was putting her things down, she noticed the tiny plastic baby Jesus lying on the center of my desk. You might remember, this tiny plastic baby Jesus was the subject of one of my sermons. She asked about it, and I told her that was where he lived, and I said, "If he's in your way, just move him to the side." And, I immediately froze, realizing what I had said.

If Jesus is in your way, just move him to the side.

We both laughed about it, and I said I needed to write that down, so I could use it for a sermon someday. But, I haven't been able to stop thinking about it. How often do we just "move Jesus to the side," when listening to him might be inconvenient, or maybe even in opposition to what we want to do? How often do we do ignore what we've been taught, or ignore that gut instinct to do the right thing because it makes us uncomfortable or because we've already decided what we want to do? How often do we think that we know better than God?

With so much going on this time of year, it can be easy to "move Jesus out of the way." Many of us have to deal with difficult family members, figure out what to do with our limited finances, or decided what to do with our limited time. It's almost a cliché to ask, "What would Jesus do?" But, if we're not asking that question, then what might be guiding our decisions instead?



Jesus calls us to compassion, generosity, trust, faith, joy, peace, and love. What kinds of decisions are we making if we ask Jesus to step to the side? In the coming seasons of thanksgiving and hope, let's remember why we celebrate. Let's invite Jesus into our hearts, into our lives, and let Jesus be our guide.

Active Stewardship

Stewardship is an ethical value that embodies the responsible management of resources such as the environment, property, or theology. Our Plymouth Church Council Coordinators have embraced their stewardship responsibilities in multiple ways. Vice Moderator Liz Gundersen stewards personnel concerns by maintaining a positive working relationship with the pastor and staff, as well as recruiting, hiring, and conducting performance assessments. Secretary Mary Drysdale records minutes of council and congregational meetings, reminding us of what was discussed, decided, and delegated. Financial Affairs Coordinator Pat Christian oversees the finances of the church, working with bookkeeper Gail Tronstad and our accounting firm to report on and analyze a complex budget. With input from committees, she will draft the preliminary annual budget for January's annual meeting.

Social Justice and Outreach Coordinator Jennifer Jeffries Thompson promotes and oversees activities that help the church serve the wider community, stewarding programs that distinguish Plymouth as a caring and generous community. Buildings and Grounds Coordinator Boyce Fowler, stewarding care and maintenance of the church and its grounds, has overseen a particularly challenging set of building improvements this year. B&G Committee member Terry Tatchell has been particularly helpful as we replaced our 60-year old boiler with two higherficiency boilers.

Pastor Charles supervises staff, leads the Worship Committee as it plans services, and works with Lynn Bolin, chair of the Pastoral Care Committee, ministering to members in times of need. Others who use their talents and time to do what's needed in the church include the Fellowship Committee, Disciple Groups, and sub-committees working on special projects. This is stewardship in action.

By sharing what we have—time, talent, and treasure--we are stewards of Plymouth Church, responsibly managing a valuable resource in our community and in our lives.




